#### FROM THE VICAR

Last month the world celebrated the seventieth anniversary of 'VJ Day' – the end of the war in the Pacific, and therefore of the Second World War.

There was of course a mixture of emotions involved, with gratitude for the end to that dreadful war, an awareness (and, for some, personal and painful memories) of the suffering of that bitter campaign, and ambivalence about the dropping of the first atomic bombs – shortening the war as they did, but ushering in a new era of international anxiety.

In Coln St Aldwyns church that Sunday we heard the testimony of one of our number who had spent the last years of the war as a young child in a Japanese internment camp, in what was then the Dutch East Indies. Her memories are still vivid of the hardships and suffering which so nearly led to her death, and to that of her mother and sister – and for her part she is quite clear that the dropping of the bombs on Hiroshima and Nagasaki saved their lives, along with those of countless others.

Those of us who heard her story were profoundly moved. We recognized a lack of bitterness – more positively indeed, a generosity of spirit and a depth of forgiveness which were humbling. Lucile herself explained to us that as a child after the war, her mother had taught her to be sad – "that's what God has given us tears for" – but not to be resentful.

Lucile shared her story not just in the context of the VJ Day celebrations, but also in response to the Gospel reading that day, of Jesus "the Bread of Life". She explained that while physical starvation brought the three of them to the brink of death, at the same time they found spiritual nourishment, even in the prison camp, from the presence of Jesus – a nourishment which she believes sustained them while so many others perished around them.

We sold a useful number of exhibits, which we need to do to finance our education programme and setting-up costs. The admissions and sales of catalogues also help raise funds – so even if you don't buy anything you are helping the charity just by visiting Fresh Air. ECCO, the children's shop, had almost a sell-out.

The volunteers at the gate, organised by David Bostock and Janet Goddard, excelled themselves. The groups we had in our educational programme were hugely diverse; some, such as Art Lift and the Nelson Trust, benefitted enormously, along with the Leonard Cheshire Homes who played a vital part in the yarn bombing. Budding artists arrived from Southrop Primary School and their subsequent work was well received in their own exhibition in the Southrop Village Hall.

Paula Lander is working on the final accounts, and when complete we will be making donations to the RAF Cadets, the Sea Cadets and the Church Youth Group (who wish any donation to go to the Scripture Union). Their meeting and greeting on the green made all the difference before the trudge down the hill. A donation will also be made for part of the arts programme of Hatherop Primary School. Not only did the children come and take part but the PTA were invaluable, both on the first night and for the NGS opening teas, when they made over £1,000. Other funds will go towards our apprenticeship programme and bursaries.

## **QUENINGTON PARISH COUNCIL**

Following concerns raised by residents about speeding in the village and a wish to have more welcoming signs at the entrances to Quenington, the Parish Council is considering installing new 'gateways' to the village. The first to be installed would be at the entrance to the village along Fairford Road; the 30 mph road markings are also to be re-sprayed to emphasize the change in speed limit. The proposed gateways would be a small white 'gate' with a 'Welcome to Quenington' sign attached.
